PALMER TOWNSHIP YOUTH CENTER PROJECT

The Palmer Youth Center Committee is a local nonprofit group that was recently formed with the goal of replacing the aging Field House at the existing Palmer Township Athletic Complex and to convert it to a new multilevel and multiuse Youth Center for Palmer Township. The existing building was built in the 1960's by Palmer Township Athletic Association volunteers and it has outlived its useful life. The current building is approximately 3,200 square feet and one level.

The new proposed facility will be a two-story facility and will include 3,600 square feet on the first level and another 5,000 square feet on the second level. The lower level will be used for Palmer Township Athletic Association functions and will include a 2,397 square foot multi-purpose room, a weigh-in room, a coach's office, a utility closet, two restroom facilities in the interior of the building and two restrooms accessible from the exterior of the building. The exterior of the first floor faces the Palmer Township All-Purpose Field and includes a Sport Porch that is 1,362 square feet.

The addition of an upper level of the facility will consist of a 2,997 square foot community room, an activities office, a storage room, a meeting room, a kitchen area, two restrooms, an anteroom, and a janitorial closet. The second level of the building will be used by community organizations and groups, such as: music groups, boys and girl scouts, church groups, charitable organizations, youth clubs, senior groups, etc.

The project is spearheaded by local businesspeople and organizations, including our lead donors: The Kiwanis Club of Palmer Township, The Palmer Township Business, Industrial, and Professional Association (BIP), and the Palmer Township Athletic Association. Architectural and civil engineering services were provided by The Pidcock Company. Area businessman, David Colver, is donating his time serving as the General Contractor of the project.

The anticipated start date of the project is 2021, with completion in 2022.

The project will be 100% funded by donations from the private sector, our own citizens, and businesses. The Palmer Youth Center Committee is a 501c3 nonprofit organization. The process for acceptance of charitable donations for this project will be announced in the summer of 2021.

The Palmer Township Youth Center Committee members are as follows: Representing The Kiwanis Club of Palmer Township: Robert Moran and Victor Scomillio; representing the Business, Industrial, and Professional Association: David Colver and Robert Smith; representing the Palmer Township Athletic Association: Craig Conner and Charles Romfo; and representing the Palmer Township Recreation Advisory Board: Liam Brohan and Thomas Lee.

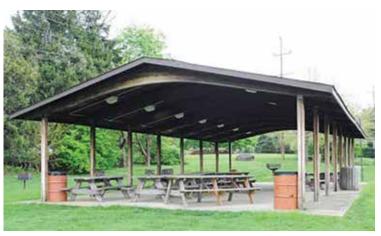

NEW BAMBOO ORDINANCE

Chapter 187, entitled "Palmer Township Bamboo Ordinance" was adopted and enacted September 8, 2020 by Ordinance 2020-461. The purpose of the ordinance is to control existing bamboo and prohibit (with exceptions) new growth.

Key highlights:

- Existing bamboo shall not be within 10 feet of any property line, curb, and/or sidewalk, or within 40 feet of any roadway, cartway, street, storm sewer, sanitary sewer and/or public water facilities within the Township.
- Upon the enacted date, no person may plant, cultivate, and/or cause to grow any bamboo on any property within the Township. Exceptions include bamboo contained in an above-ground planter designed to contain the root system. See §187-4(D) for the full text of exceptions.
- Provides for enforcement action to require removal and penalties.

TEMPORARY POOLS



All temporary pools <u>capable</u> of holding more than 24 inches of water **DO** require a permit and inspection each year the pool is erected. The permit must be obtained **prior** to installation. Use of the pool shall be prohibited until an inspection is obtained and approval has been issued by the Building Department.

Please be aware that pools with heights between 24 inches and 48 inches will require a permanent barrier in accordance with the 2015 International Residential Code/2015 International Pool & Spa Code. Also, overhead power lines, grade slopes and zoning setbacks will have an impact as to the allowable location of a pool. Call the Building Code Department with any questions at 610-253-7191 ext. 1115.

GRASS/NOXIOUS VEGETATION AND SIDEWALK CLEARANCE

Spring is finally here and it is time to put down that snow shovel and start-up the lawn mower! Palmer's ordinances limit the height of grass to a maximum of 6-inches.

Also, please maintain the sidewalk clear of impeding tree branches, bushes and decorative vegetation by cutting such back so that the full width of the sidewalk, to a height of 7-feet, is accessible for the safety of pedestrians.

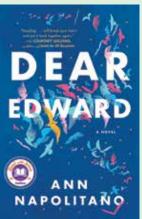

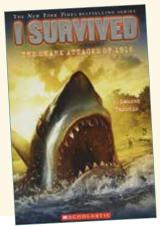

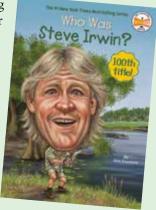

Every day is Earth Day!! Keeping Palmer Beautiful is not a one-person effort, nor a one-day event. It is a continuous community effort!

COVID-19 has resulted in the need to get out of your quarantine quarters and utilize our local trails and public parks. This increased public use has resulted in an increase in the amount of litter left along the trails and in the parks. How does this impact you?

The health and well-being of your trails and parks is reliant upon you to <u>carry out what you carry</u> <u>in</u>. Township Parks have many trash barrels available for your use. Dog litter bags and bins, located at the trail heads, are provided by our local Business, Industrial and Professional (BIP) organization, to properly dispose of this waste. There are also several locations along the trails that have trash barrels for your use!

Please remember to pick up after your pet and not leave their bagged or unbagged waste trailside!

Palmer Township has a small group of volunteer residents called the Earth Stewards of Palmer Township (EarthStewardsofPalmer@gmail.com) who clear litter from your trails. Why not help them help you? Want to help or work alongside them, please contact them at the above email address. Here is a simple suggestion, while out enjoying nature, carry a bag and when you see some litter on the trailside, roadside or upon your lawn, use the bag to protect yourself, pick it up and carry the littered items to the nearest trash/ recycling barrel.

The majority of your trails are adjacent to waterways or drain into local streams and rivers and ultimately the Atlantic Ocean. Litter finds its way into our local waterways and ultimately into your drinking and recreational waters! We all have heard about the "Great Pacific Ocean Plastics Patch." You may not realize that there is also an Atlantic Ocean plastics and trash patch with a density of more than 200,000 pieces of debris per square mile. The source of this debris field originates from plastics of all kinds and mainly consists of micro-plastics traveling from your local waterways into the Atlantic Ocean. The garbage patch is a major hazard to both wildlife and humans through plastics consumption via the wildlife and plants consumed from our waterways and oceans.

This is not an issue that impacts only the other person, it is an issue that adversely and financially impacts you via littered streets, lawns, waterways and ultimately our food supply. *Your family, friends and neighbors are reliant upon you to do your part to keep Palmer Beautiful!*

Since the 1950's Suburban EMS has provided exceptional emergency care and transport to the community. Over the years, Suburban EMS has grown to accommodate the community needs in 19 municipalities in Northampton and Monroe counties.

Why Should I Cut and Leave My Grass Clippings?

- Clippings left on the lawn, shelter and help retain water, therefore requiring less watering. As the clippings decompose, they act as a natural organic fertilizer, reducing the amount of fertilizer you need to purchase and apply.
- A typical 1/2-acre lawn in Pennsylvania produces more than three tons--nearly 260 bags--of grass clippings each year and moving these bags can hurt your back! Grass clippings can represent from 20 to 50 percent of the solid waste going into landfills in the spring and summer and dramatically increases the trash hauling cost for township residents.
- Years of research have shown that by mowing frequently (5-6 times per month) and not bagging grass clippings, homeowners can save up to 40% of the time they spend on routine lawn care!

Simple Steps for Grasscycling

- Cut only the top 1/3 of the grass blade and LEAVE the clippings right on the lawn
- · Keep your mower blade sharp and mow when the grass is dry to avoid tracking and clumping
- If the grass gets too high, mow over the clippings a second time to further shred and scatter them.
- To prevent excess growth between mowings, raise the mower height, mow, then gradually lower it over a span of several mowings. This will help prevent shock to the plants.
- Thatch, a matted layer of dead roots and stems, usually is caused by too much water and fertilizer. Clippings don't produce thatch because they are 80 percent water and decompose quickly.
- No special equipment is necessary. While mulching mowers are available and do a great job, any conventional mower can grasscycle just remove the collection bag! In the case of rear discharge mowers, the exhaust chute must be shut off.
- Mulching blades, adapter kits or retrofit kits are now readily available for your conventional mowers.
- By not trashing grass, you can reduce your mowing time by nearly 40 percent and spend less money on fertilizer and trash bags. And you'll be doing your part for the environment by reducing waste.

Waste Management expects that residents will not notice any changes in their weekly collections or special curbside collections. Waste Management utilizes a fleet of quiet and clean-operating compressed natural gas trucks. CNG is one of the cleanest burning fuels available and reduces carbon monoxide emissions 90 to 97 percent and is equivalent to taking as many as 325 cars off the road.



Special curbside collections for the remainder of the year will be as follows:

Bulk Item Collections: Weeks of May 10, September 13, and November 29

Metal and Appliances Collection: Week of September 27, 2021; Freon no longer needs to be removed prior to collection.

Yard Waste Collections: Weeks of June 7 and November 8

All items should be placed curbside by 5:00am on your scheduled collection day, and they will be collected that week by a separate truck. Check the website for acceptable items.

Holidays - Waste and recycling will not be collected on Memorial Day, Labor Day or Thanksgiving Day. Collections will be delayed by one day following these holidays.
