

PALMER FIRE DEPARTMENT

As we begin ridding our yards of fall and winter debris, remember open burning of yard waste is strictly prohibited within Palmer Township, and you could be subject to a fine.





Palmer Fire responds to numerous mulch bed fires throughout the spring and summer months. When dry, mulch creates enough heat to self-combust, it will quickly spread to houses and yard fences. A good practice is to water your mulch beds frequently with your garden hose.

When enjoying the summer months outdoors with a fire, Palmer Township regulations only permits burning in a fire place which is attached with a flue or metal grate overtop. Camp fires and fire pits are strictly prohibited, and may result in a fine.

What is FOG? It's not a dark looming cloud, but it does create havoc! Fats, oils, and grease better known as FOG haunts our home sewer systems. Not only is it a nuisance it costs us money. FOG is the unwanted byproduct of food preparation. It comes from a variety of food sources such as butter, meats, sauces, milk products, plant oils, dressings, and gravies. FOG usually is found in a liquid form when heated and then becomes solid or semisolid when cooled. As we clean and rinse our dishes as well as prepare food, we accumulate FOG which likely finds its way down our drains. This FOG as it hardens attaches to the sides of our pipes and slows down the flow through our lateral sewer lines in our homes to the main sewer lines in the street. Ultimately the pipes will clog and back up resulting in a nasty mess and costly cleanup. FOG that finds its way into the main sewer lines can create an even larger blockage and damage to multiple properties with a resulting increased cost to sewer services.




So how do you fight back against this monster? Well, it's quite easy. Avoid putting fats, oil and grease down the drain. Here are a few helpful hints to battle and beat the grease monster:

Dry clean up - soak up grease with paper towels and put in trash

Can it - put excess grease into a container with lid, refrigerate or cool till hardens and put in trash

Bird Food - use excess grease and mix with bird seed, let harden to make suet cakes... Who knew???

Reuse - leftover fat can be strained, stored, and reused in cooking to add flavor

Palmer Township Business, Industrial and Professional Association News


On March 23, 2022, the BIP held its first business community luncheon meeting at XGolf Lehigh Valley, 80 Kunkle Drive, Palmer, PA. Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, Jeffrey Young, welcomed everyone and explained the recent changes to the Palmer Township Board of Supervisors, as a result of the Fall 2021 election.



Young said, Palmer Township's two new elected Supervisors are Joseph Armato and Michael Brett. They join your three previous Board members: K. Michael Mitchell, Ann-Marie Panella, and himself, and we are all looking forward to working together on behalf of our township residents.

Young then turned the meeting over to Township Manager, Robert Williams. Williams said, it was great to see everyone again, since these luncheons have not taken place since before the COVID-19 Pandemic. Williams spoke about the challenges the

Township endured during the past three years, to include a budget deficit of \$2 million. He talked about the difficult decisions that had to be made and how the Township is adjusting and preparing for our future and better days ahead.

Williams then introduced Cynthia Carman Kramer, Palmer Township's Director of Planning. Kramer provided a comprehensive overview of current, and future development activity within the Township.

She reviewed the current single family housing projects taking place to include Parkview Estates Phase 8, Rau Lane, and Northwood Farms. She moved on to the apartment complex known as Palmer Point Apartments now being built on Hartley Avenue. She also discussed the future traffic improvements that will take place at the intersection of Greenwood and Hartley Avenues, as a result of this project. Kramer then talked about the recently approved Villages at Wolf's Run development, which is a townhouse development located off Van Buren Road.

Kramer discussed in detail the 17-large-scale industrial buildings that have been constructed in the north end of the township over the past 14 years. Of all 17-buildings, only one, 1000 Carson Court, has not yet been occupied, due to traffic signal improvements that are required on Main Street that they are awaiting PennDOT approval to install. Also, after a recent tenant relocate, the building at 1520 Van Buren Road, is only partially occupied. The total unoccupied space across all buildings is 480,770 square feet, which equates to an occupancy rate of 92%. Kramer continued to explain the property taxes that will be paid by all these properties in 2022, that will total over \$8.2 million. The breakdown for the different taxing authorities of this total amount is about \$800,000 to Palmer Township, \$1 million to Northampton County and \$6.4 million to the Easton Area School District, of which about \$4.6 million will go to repayment of the bond for the Route 33 interchange. Kramer also reviewed current plans that have been submitted to the township for review by the Planning Commission and then discussed in detail the process that has taken place as far as an update to the existing Township Zoning Ordinance. Kramer said, the process began in late 2018 after the most recent update to the Township Comprehensive Plan was finalized. The process was put on hold during the Pandemic since it is important that all township residents have an opportunity to participate in public meetings to provide input on any proposed changes to the ordinance. She noted the Township hired a consulting firm, Environmental Planning and Design from Pittsburgh, who assisted in the Zoning re-write. A committee was formed that included township staff, members of the Planning Commission, two members of the Board of Supervisors and two township residents. The proposed changes are now being reviewed in meetings with the Planning Commission and will then be forwarded on to the Board of Supervisors for review and comment and public hearings will be held for the public's input. Residents are encouraged to become active in this process and attend these meetings. The current Zoning Ordinance Workshop meetings with the Planning Commission are scheduled for the third Tuesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. in the Municipal Building meeting room.







A President's Note...

The Miracle League of Northampton County, which provides a barrier free baseball facility for children and young adults with intellectual and physical disabilities, will be celebrating its 10th year of operation during the 2022 spring and fall seasons. I remember when it all started here in Palmer Township back in 2010 when the idea of building a Miracle League field was born. Dan McKinney spoke about the Miracle League at the Palmer Kiwanis Club and member Bob Lammi was intrigued enough to bring the idea to the Palmer Supervisors of which he was a member. The Supervisors voted unanimously to provide land at the Charles Chrin Community Center of Palmer Township site to build the field. The next step was finding a location and building a board of directors for the Miracle League. The board was created fairly quickly and the township provided a 30-year lease to our league once the location was approved for \$1.00 a year.



It was important to us to incorporate the County of Northampton into the project and both John Stoffa and Tom Harp came on board. Other original board members included Mike Dowd, Patty Stout, Bob Lammi, Lisa Colver, Chuck Frantz, Chris Brett, John Lahutsky, Kelly Taylor, Deb Young, Bob Pruznick, and Tom Schupper. Dan McKinney and Amanda Sechrist were and still are our Co-Directors. I was voted as President and I could not be more proud to lead this truly remarkable endeavor we were about to begin. After completing a philanthropic study to survey whether our community could support this \$750,000 project, we found that yes it could in fact support it. We had our press conference at the Charles Chrin Community Center in November of 2010 announcing to the public what we were about to bring to our community and followed the press conference with a groundbreaking ceremony at the land site where our field now sits adjacent to the Community Center. The most important thing we did was to bring Dave Colver on board as our project manager. Dave, who donated his services, was remarkable as he brought together all of the pieces of building a Miracle to Palmer Township as the field was built in less than two years as we celebrated our opening day in September, 2012.

We started with about 85 registered athletes with intellectual and physical disabilities and we currently are up to 350 athletes. I remember the day it all began at our opening ceremony with an outpouring from the community and all of our athletes on-hand for this joyous moment. Our field is named "Easton Rotary Field" because of their pledge of \$100,000. But it was incredible how our community put their arms around this project with their donations, plus all of the in-kind donations, that allowed these children and adults the opportunity to play baseball. Whenever we asked anyone for help, the answer was always yes! And now, 10 years later, we continue to thrive.

In closing, I wish to thank our community for their continuing support of our Miracle League, "the diamond jewel of our community." Most importantly, our deepest thanks to all of our parents who allow us the privilege of providing their children the opportunity to play baseball. Our league begins this spring on May 7 and continues each Saturday beginning at 10:00 am and also with a game on Tuesday and Thursday nights. Our last games are June 22. Fire Zones

Our Officers are continuing to patrol upon vehicles double parking in fire zones in our shopping center parking lots. Fire Zones are marked with signs and painted markings on the ground, that designate the areas vehicles may NOT park. If a vehicle is parked in a fire zone, at any time, they can be cited and risk having their vehicle towed. Please do not park in fire zones, it is a public safety issue in the event of an emergency.









TEMPORARY POOLS

All temporary pools capable of holding more than 24 inches of water DO require a permit and inspection each year the pool is erected. The permit must be obtained before installation occurs. Use of the pool shall be prohibited until an inspection is obtained and approval has been issued by the Building Department.

Please be aware that pools with heights between 24 inches and 48 inches will require a permanent barrier in accordance with the 2015 International Residential Code/2015 International Pool & Spa Code. Also, overhead power lines, grade slopes and zoning setbacks will have an impact as to the allowable location of a pool. Call the Building Code Department with any questions at 610-253-7191.

GRASS/NOXIOUS VEGETATION AND SIDEWALK CLEARANCE

Spring is finally here and it is time to put down that snow shovel and start-up the lawn mower! Palmer's ordinances limit the height of grass to a maximum of 6-inches.

Also, please maintain the sidewalk clear of impeding tree branches, bushes and decorative vegetation by cutting such back so that the full width of the sidewalk, to a height of 7-feet, is accessible for the safety of pedestrians.





BAMBOO ORDINANCE

Chapter 187, entitled "Palmer Township Bamboo Ordinance" was adopted and enacted September 8, 2020 by Ordinance 2020-461. The purpose of the ordinance is to control existing bamboo and prohibit (with exceptions) new growth.

Key highlights:

- Existing bamboo shall not be within 10 feet of any property line, curb, and/or sidewalk, or within 40 feet of any roadway, cartway, street, storm sewer, sanitary sewer and/or public water facilities within the Township.
- Upon the enacted date, no person may plant, cultivate, and/or cause to grow any bamboo on any property within the Township. Exceptions include bamboo contained in an above-ground planter designed to contain the root system. See §187-4(D) for the full text of exceptions.
- Provides for enforcement action to require removal and penalties.



MS4 – CHARLES CHRIN COMMUNITY CENTER OF PALMER TOWNSHIP SITE BEST MANAGEMENT PRACTICES

In 2005, the Charles Chrin Community Center of Palmer Township was built for Palmer residents and the surrounding community to enjoy. Some improvements were made to the Community Center site as well as the installation of Best Management Practices (BMPs) for storm water in 2017. Improvements to the Community Center site included a new artificial turf field, a new soccer field, a walking trail around the grounds, and an expansion of the parking lot. New BMPs that were added to the Charles Chrin Community Center include a retention/detention basin with aerators, a pump house with a spray irrigation system, a water quality inlet and subsurface filtration systems underneath the turf field and a nearby PAC parking lot. Each of these BMP improvements plays an important part of keeping Palmer Township's storm water system running smoothly and improving storm water runoff quality.

The detention/retention basin holds excess storm water runoff from impervious surfaces near the Community Center. As storm water is collected in the detention


basin, it allows any silt or sediment in the water to settle as well as any floating debris to be removed. The detention/retention basin allows for peak runoff rate attenuation which means that the flow rate of the runoff is prolonged so that the outlet is not overwhelmed by water flowing too quickly through the system. Aerators are important for this system in the retention basin because when water is stationary for long periods of time, debris starts to collect and oxygen in the water is depleted. Aerators agitate the water surface keeping it moving while also adding oxygen which helps keep water clear and reduces algae growth. Water is then transported from the retention basin via a system of pipes that bring water to the pump house. From there, the excess runoff can be transported to one of three spray irrigation fields that surround the Community Center site. This irrigation system allows stormwater to be purified naturally through the soil and recharges the groundwater while also reducing the volume of water transported through the storm sewers.



The water quality inlet BMP at the Community Center site functions by filtering stormwater and separating debris, sediment, and pollutants from storm runoff. These types of inlets also save space and construction costs because they can be added to already existing storm drains.

The last improvement to the Community Center site BMPs was adding a subsurface infiltration system to the artificial turf field. This means that when constructing the turf field at the Community Center site, the designer gave water a route through the top turf layer so that it could reach the soil and recharge the groundwater. A similar system is also used in the near-by PAC parking lot adjacent to the Community Center. This reduces runoff from impervious surfaces and takes pressure off the stormwater system and allows the rain to recharge the groundwater table.

These BMPs work together to do an important job and to keep the community and Palmer Township healthy. Each BMP does their own part to help manage the quality and volume of stormwater runoff at the Charles Chrin Community Center, as well as return water to its natural place in the soil to recharge our groundwater and help keep it pollutant free. Next time you are visiting the Charles Chrin Community Center of Palmer Township make sure to take some time to appreciate the BMPs there helping to keep our water clean. 

NATIVE PLANT GARDEN - SELECTING PLANTS

So, you've decided to add a native plant garden to your backyard because you've read that they support the web of local life, providing food for birds, butterflies (and their caterpillars), bees, and other insects. That means you'll need to find native plants. But how do you know it actually is native?

Is it in the look? If you see a plant growing almost everywhere around you, does that mean it's native? Unfortunately no. Many non-native plants are in our neighborhoods, and some of them are invasive. Commonly seen does not mean native.



Is it in the name? Let's see if that works. Here's a quick quiz. Without using Google, which two of the following plants are native to the United States?

A. Boston Ivy C. Korean Spice Viburnum E. Norway Maple B. Eastern Red Cedar D. Montauk Daisy F. Turk's Cap Lily

Look at the end of this article for the answer. Are you surprised? Common names of plants can be deceptive.

If you can't rely on how common the plant is or on its common name, then how do you know? There are several options. You can go to a nursery that specializes in native plants, like Edge of the Woods in Orefield, PA. Or you can go to a native plant sale, such as those held at Bowman's Hill Wildflower Preserve in New Hope, PA. Staff at these places can also advise you on the best plants to select for your site.

If you will be buying plants from a garden center that sells a mixture of native and non-native plants, research the scientific names of the plants and look up their ancestry. There are websites that specialize in providing information on native plants, such as the Audubon Native Plant Database and the Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center Plant Database.

Now that you know how to locate native plants, which native plants should you select? "Right plant, right place" comes to mind. Just like some people are beach people whereas others like cool shade, plants also have their preferences. A plant that prefers moist shade will not be happy in the middle of a dry, sunny yard. Know the characteristics of where you intend to plant them and select accordingly. And try to select a variety of plants with different bloom times and flower shapes. Insects also have preferences, and you'll be feeding nature throughout the year.

WHAT IS ZONING?

Zoning is a tool used by local governments to carry out their long-term plans for how land gets used. The word comes from the practice of designating mapped zones, or zoning districts, which regulate the use, form, design and compatibility of development. Legally, a zoning plan takes the form of a map, which shows the boundaries of the various districts, and an ordinance, which spells out the regulations that are applicable in each district.

The primary purpose of zoning is to separate land uses that are thought to be incompatible with one another. In practice, zoning is also used to prevent new development from interfering with existing uses or to preserve the existing character of a community. Zoning may include regulation of the types of activities which will be acceptable on particular lots (such as



residential, commercial, industrial or open space), as well as regulations that apply to each use, such as building size and height, the distance between the building and the property lines, parking, signage, lighting, landscaping and open space.

Most zoning ordinances have a procedure for granting variances or special exceptions to the zoning regulations, usually because of some perceived hardship caused by the particular nature of the property in question. Such requests are decided by the Zoning Hearing Board, who are appointed by the governing body. Conditional uses allow for increased flexibility and permits municipalities to respond to the unique features of a particular land use application. Uses which might not be allowed by right, such as apartments or warehouses, may be permitted by conditional use after a hearing before the governing body to evaluate the impacts on the community. Overlay districts are special zones which are applied in addition to the underlying zoning district to allow additional uses or characteristics if certain criteria can be met.

WHAT'S WITH ALL THE WAREHOUSES?

Over the last 10+ years, Palmer Township has experienced unprecedented industrial growth in its northern end, and the demand for developable land continues.

While the northern tier of the township has for over 40 years been planned as the area where economic growth should occur in the form of industrial development, there is increasing concern that the area is becoming overdeveloped.

Two questions that have specifically been asked are:

What is the occupancy rate of the buildings that have been constructed?

How much do these industrial property owners pay in property taxes?

The Township recently released a report is to summarize the large-scale industrial development that has occurred over the last 15 years in the north end of Palmer Township, and what the economic result of this development has been.


Since 2008, there have been 17 large-scale industrial buildings constructed on 16 properties in the northern end of Palmer Township.

The total square footage of these 17 buildings is 6,013,552. At the time of this writing, of these 17 buildings, only one had not yet been occupied yet, and one was only partially unoccupied, after a previous tenant had relocated. The total unoccupied space across all buildings was 480,770 square feet, which equates to an occupancy rate of 92% (or 8% vacancy rate.)

It should be noted that none of the properties have received any local tax incentive or tax break for locating in Palmer Township. However, for properties located within the designated Tax Increment Financing (TIF) district, all three taxing bodies have pledged a portion of the taxes collected toward payment of a bond that was issued for construction of the highway interchange at Route 33 and MainStreet.

In total, the 16 properties will pay \$8,228,211.09 in property taxes in 2022, which breaks down to \$791,820.15 to Palmer Township, \$1,036,564.56 to Northampton County and \$6,399,826.38 to Easton Area School District. Of this total, the 3 taxing bodies combined will pay \$4,612,413.23 toward repayment of the TIF Bond for the Route 33 Interchange. At the current rate of repayment, the bond is expected to be paid off by 2025, six years ahead of schedule.

The full report provides a snapshot look at each individual property, including the property owner, building size, year of construction, tenant, type of use and current tax obligation based on the 2022 millage rates for Palmer Township, Northampton County and Easton Area School District.
