The BIP held its second quarter General Membership Luncheon on March 22, 2023, at the Marblehead Chowder House. Did you know...

If you walk along any portion of the Palmer Township bike path, you are

probably familiar with the dog waste stations. The BIP purchased ten stations several years ago. Since then, the township has purchased three additional stations placed at strategic locations along the path. Stations are located along the Lehigh River at Riverview Park, Bushkill Creek, and Fairview Park paths.

The use of the stations has turned into a "good news, bad news" situation. The good news is the stations are faithfully and frequently used by our many dog walkers resulting in a clean, safe and sanitary bike path. The bad news is the cost of bag replenishment. In 2022 the township parks department personnel replaced over

30,000 dog waste bags for a cost of \$3,000. Although the township appreciates this gift that keeps on giving, the cost has become excessive. The Palmer BIP has contributed \$1,500 annually to the township to offset some of these costs.

The township greatly appreciated this donation, which is another example of the fantastic public-private partnership that exists between Palmer Township and the Palmer BIP.

The BIP Board of Directors at their April meeting also approved a \$11,000 donation to the township to assist in the purchase of a new electronic digital sign at Route 248 and Northampton Street. This sign will replace the existing sign that was purchased in 2012 by the township, the BIP and the Lions Club. This sign is available to non-profit community and civic groups. 

MS4-HRG

What is considered a utility? Most people would say that a utility is a useful service provided to you at a cost. Utilities are used across the country to make life more convenient. Some examples are electricity, sewers, water, and gas. Although utilities are supposed to give you a service, there is no guarantee that the service provided will be high quality. For example, if you lose electricity in your home once a week for seven months, that would not be considered a high-quality electric service.

While most utilities deliver you something, there are utilities designed to take products away to make life easier, such as sanitary sewers. In recent months, Palmer Township has shifted to view stormwater as a utility. Stormwater can be thought of as a utility because an organization, usually a combination of a stormwater authority and municipal government, manages stormwater within the municipality including how stormwater flows, where it is collected, and the infrastructure it travels through. This shift in understanding of stormwater is necessary because the federal government mandated a stormwater program called the Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System Program (MS4) in 2003.

The MS4 program requires municipalities across the country to track, monitor, improve and educate residents and the public

on the importance of stormwater management. At the start of the program, it was promised that MS4 would not require more work than what the Township was already doing. Now, 20 years later, municipalities must update



ordinances, create pollutant reduction plans, as well as have public meetings and educational events to teach residents about best management practices for stormwater. Not only did the federal government make the program mandatory, but they also created it as an unfunded mandate, which means municipalities must perform storm sewer upkeep with no additional state or federal funds to pay workers, buy equipment, or update infrastructure.

This lack of funding has created an expounding list of over 70 projects regarding stormwater in the Township that will take time to complete. Stormwater upkeep has been a drain of time and resources for municipalities, and in most cases can only be given attention on an emergency basis. Now, Palmer Township is working with the engineering firm, Herbert Rowland, and Grubic Inc. (HRG), to evaluate, plan and improve how Palmer manages its stormwater. MS4 Best Management Practices-Rain Barrels

Though many believe the weatherman is reliable, atmospheric conditions are constantly changing and shifting, influencing the weather we experience on the ground. One of these dynamic factors of weather is precipitation. Whether it is rain, snow, sleet or hail, water can fall at unpredictable times bringing needed moisture, or ruining your favorite pair of pants before a meeting. One of the simplest ways to conserve our precious water resources is by installing a rain barrel for your home.

Rain barrels intercept storm runoff from your roof and store it for later when you may need to water plants or rinse off your muddy shoes (Mansberger, 2023; EPA, 2023). It is not recommended to use rain barrel water for consumption or watering edible plants because of bacteria, mold, and other substances that can be washed from your roof (Mansberger, 2023; EPA, 2023). Although rain barrel water is not meant for drinking, using a rain barrel can still save water resources around your home. For instance, almost 30% of daily water use can be attributed to lawn and garden maintenance (Mansberger, 2023). These practices could be damaging your garden in the long term because untreated water without chlorine is better for plant growth

(Mansberger, 2023). Rain barrels also have other benefits such as reducing pollution entering streams, preventing erosion, and having a water source for your lawn during a drought (Mansberger, 2023).

Rain barrel set-up can be simple, or complicated depending on how much water you want to store, or what your goal is for your rain barrel. Most rain barrels have the same basic parts including a hole at the top of the barrel with a screen to stop leaves and insects from entering the container, a sealed lid, a downspout connection, an overflow outlet, a faucet near or at the bottom of the barrel, and a raised platform to increase water pressure (Mansberger, 2023). These parts of a rain barrel can be seen in



the picture above, taken at the 2023 Earth Day event held by the Palmer Environmental Steering Committee (ESC), along with other stormwater education materials. There are many ways to obtain a rain barrel; Palmer ESC held rain barrel seminars in the past, or rain barrels are readily available for purchase at stores with outdoor or garden sections. CURBSIDE RECYCLING

All carts should be placed curbside by 5:00am. Materials placed outside of the carts will not be collected. Lids need to be closed and not overflowing to prevent litter and cart lid breakage.



PAPER – office and school paper, newsprint, junk mail, paper bags, phone books, magazines, catalogs, envelopes, wrapping paper (no metallic paper or bows.) Shredded paper should be bagged and placed in the trash cart.

CARDBOARD – paper towel rolls, cereal, cracker, and pasta boxes, shipping and shoe boxes, manila folders, etc. No wax-coated, pizza or other food, paint or oil contaminated boxes. Flatten and/or cut up to release from the cart easily.

PLASTIC BOTTLES OR CONTAINERS – Rinsed household tubs and bottles (such as soda, water, milk, juice, shampoo, detergent, condiments, yogurt, margarine, to-go containers, pet food, etc.) No plastic bags or Styrofoam. Look for the recycling triangle on the bottom with these numbers inside #1, #2, #3, #4, #5, #6, #7. Lids attached.

FLEXIBLE (NOT RIGID) PLASTICS – these are <u>able to flex or wrap and are rinsed clean of food contamination</u>. Acceptable items include plastic shopping bags, potato chip and snack bags, produce bags including salad and carrot bags, shredded cheese packages, pet treat pouches, case wrap, shrink film, bread bags, bubble wrap, cereal bags, drink pouches, paper towel and toilet paper overwraps, detergent pouches, shipping bags.

GLASS - Rinsed clear, brown, and green bottles and jars. Discard lids.

CANS – Rinsed aluminum, bi-metal, and tin cans as well as empty aerosol cans.

METAL POTS AND PANS

CARTONS – Rinsed food cartons that contain milk, juice, broth, cream, egg substitutes, soup, soy milk, and wine boxes.

No food contaminated items, electronics, textiles, construction debris, or yard waste.

2023 HOLIDAY COLLECTIONS

Waste and recycling collections will be delayed by one day following these holidays: Labor Day, Thanksgiving, and Christmas.

CURBSIDE TRASH

- All trash goes into your green cart with the green lid. Materials outside the cart will not be collected.
- Trash should be bagged before being placed in the cart. Bagging helps keep your cart clean and reduces windblown litter.
- <u>Prohibited items include recyclables</u> (see left), tires, hazardous waste, liquid paint, motor oil, electronics, yard waste, construction debris (wood, concrete, window panes, etc.), dirt. rock, and car parts.
- Overfilled carts or carts containing prohibited items will not be collected.

RECYCLING DROP-OFF LOCATIONS

Open to Palmer Residents & Businesses Only

Hartley Avenue Recycling Center

Monday, Wednesday, Friday, 8:00am—4:00pm Saturday, 10:00am-3:00pm Sunday, 12:00pm-4:00pm

Accepts paper, cardboard, plastic bottles and containers, glass, cans, scrap metals, and yard waste (no more than 3 small bundles of yard waste (no larger than 3' x 3' and not exceeding 40 lbs.) per visit. Free to Palmer residents and businesses.

Berks Street Yard Waste Composting Center

April through November Saturday - 10 AM to 4 PM Sunday - 12 Noon to 4 PM Wednesdays - 9 AM to 3 PM

Accepts large amounts of yard waste for a small fee. NO plastic rope, bags, or twine; grass clippings, tree stumps, soil or dirt, sod, wood, animal excrement, or noxious weeds including bamboo of any kind. Tree limbs must be less than 12" inches in diameter.

Speed limit within the center is 5 MPH at all times.

UPCOMING SPECIAL CURBSIDE COLLECTIONS

Place curbside on your scheduled collection day, but will be collected that <u>week</u> by a separate vehicle.

BULK ITEM COLLECTION: Weeks of September 11, & November 27

One item per collection. Bulk items are defined as items too large to fit into the trash cart; with the general rule of thumb being an item the approximate dimensions and weight of a standard size sofa, and that can be carried by two (2) men. Acceptable items include plastic dishwashers, furniture, mattresses and box springs (wrapped in plastic), rugs rolled up and tied and no larger than 3' x 6'. Unacceptable items include, but are not limited to, electronics, construction debris (i.e. wood, sinks, toilets, doors, windows, siding, roofing shingles, etc.), large glass items (i.e. glass tables, china cabinets, or window panes), hazardous materials, tires, yard waste, grass clippings, or additional household trash. If you can't wait for a bulk item collection, you may request a special bulk item collection by contacting Waste Management Customer Service at 800.621.2100. Identify yourself as a resident of Palmer Township, PA to receive the Township's \$40 per item pickup price. Be sure to get the confirmation number in the event follow-up is needed.

METAL AND APPLIANCES COLLECTION: Week of September 25

One item per collection. Appliances such as microwaves, air conditioners, dehumidifiers, refrigerators and freezers (remove doors; FREON does not need to be removed); washers, dryers, metal dishwashers, steel or aluminum tire rims (w/o tires), hot water heaters, metal swing sets (taken apart and tied up), bicycles, BBQ grills (gas, propane, and/or charcoal removed), and pushbehind lawnmowers (oil and gas removed). No electronics or plastic dishwashers. Metal items and appliances, as described here, can be taken to the Palmer Township Recycling Center, 3600 Hartley Avenue, year-round.

YARD WASTE COLLECTION: November 6

Unlimited amounts of yard waste (leaves, branches, twigs, flowers, roots, bushes, garden clippings) will be collected curbside. You must place your yard waste at the curb in one of the following ways or it will NOT be collected –



 $Place\ your\ yard\ waste\ in\ any\ clean,\ open-top\ container\ (NOT\ YOUR\ AUTOMATED\ CART).$

Tie your yard waste with cotton or hemp twine in bundles no larger than 3' x 3' x 3', weighing no more than 40 lbs. (NO PLASTIC ROPE OR TWINE).

Place your yard waste in compostable paper bags (NO PLASTIC BAGS).

No grass clippings, tree stumps loose soils, sod, wood, or tree limbs over four inches in diameter; human or animal excrement; noxious weeds or soil contaminated with hazardous substances.

LEAF COLLECTION: Eight weeks in the Fall (typically mid-October to second week of December)

Residents must rake their leaves into the street and close to the curb. This collection is highly dependent on weather conditions.

CHRISTMAS TREE COLLECTION - First three (3) full weeks in January

Remove any transport bags, tinsel, ornaments, lights, and tree stands.



 - 1. Penn Pump Pavilion Permit *Not to exceed 150 people. Allows parking near the pavilion and pavilion access. **Residents \$100.00**

PA Vehicle Code, Title 75, Chapter 37

Covers litter and waste dropped, thrown, or deposited from a vehicle that lands upon any highway, other public or private property without the consent of the owner, or into or on the waters of the Commonwealth. Vehicle owners are responsible even if the owner was not driving or was not in the vehicle. A summary offense and may be sentenced to either or both:

1. To pay a fine of not more than \$900 in an easement purchased under the Agricultural Area Security Law, \$600 in an

agricultural security area, or \$300 anywhere else.

Fines are doubled in designated Litter Enforcement Corridors.

2. To pick up trash:

1st conviction: between 8 and 16 hours. 2nd conviction: between 16 and 32 hours. 3rd and more convictions: 40 and 80 hours.

PA Vehicle Code, Title 75, Chapter 49

Covers escape vehicle loads that cause injury to a person or damage to another vehicle or other property as a result of improper securing of such load. A summary offense and may be sentenced to:

1. If no injury or damage, pay a fine of between \$100 and \$300.2. If it results in injury or damage to another vehicle or property, pay a fine of between \$300 and \$1,000. Fines are doubled in designated Litter Enforcement Corridors.

PA Crimes Code, Title 18, Chapter 65, § 6501 (a)(1), (a)(2)

Covers litter or waste deposited into or upon any road or rightof-way, land of another, or into the waters of the Commonwealth. This can include someone illegally disposing of their trash or someone who is paid to dispose of trash.

ECOLOGICALLY FRIENDLY LAWN MAINTENANCE

Many people desire the look of a well-manicured lawn, but the traditional methods of maintaining a property are not the best for the environment. They fill up our landfills with grass clippings and yard waste and damage our streams and fish. When lawns are fertilized too heavily or at inappropriate times, runoff from a storm allows fertilizer to contaminate local bodies of water and their watersheds. This causes an increased risk of algae blooms which kill fish and other aquatic life. When doing yard work, we would all like to save time and money while maintaining an attractive property. The following tips for lawn maintenance can be beneficial from both an environmental and financial standpoint. These practices save you time and money, but also prevent usable materials from being deposited into landfills, if you can even find a landfill that accepts grass clippings.



- 1. When mowing your lawn, "cut it and leave it," also known as "grasscycling," is the best practice. Refraining from bagging cut grass saves the cost of purchasing the bags and saves time by avoiding the dumping of grass clippings into garbage bags. The clippings protect the grass roots from the heat and drying action of the sun, which conserves moisture for the roots of the grass. As these clippings decompose, they provide your lawn with free nutrients such as nitrogen, potassium, and phosphorus, which are major ingredients in store-purchased fertilizers. Money is again saved because the lawn needs less nutrients.
- Keeping your mower blades sharpened and mowing when the lawn is dry will allow for the best cut and the least amount of grass clumps remaining on the lawn. Using a mulching blade will reduce the grass clippings to a smaller size to help minimize clumping.
- **3.** If you are planting grass seeds, do not use a weed pre-emergent barrier product because it will also prevent your grass seeds from growing.
- 4. Before applying fertilizer, get a soil type analysis for your lawn to determine what, if any, nutrients and minerals are needed. You may be able to skip some lawn treatments.
- **5.** If applying lime to the lawn to raise the alkalinity of your soil, follow the product's recommendations for the square footage of your lawn. You can apply lime in the spring and fall.

- 6. When considering fertilizer for your lawn, more is not better.

 Excess fertilizer just runs off in the next rainstorm. Always follow the instructions on the bag, for there are many types of fertilizer being sold with many different added ingredients. Each requires specific application procedures: some need to be applied to a dry lawn, some wet.
- 7. Many lawn treatment companies insist on at least three fertilizer applications per season. This results in a very green lawn and a high rate of growth, especially in the spring, and may require more frequent mowing. Avoid these high costs by applying fertilizer only in the autumn and perhaps in the spring. Fertilizing your lawn twice per year is more than enough to maintain a healthy grass root structure and turf. The fall application of fertilizer allows for grass root development during the winter months, and the spring application boosts the summer season's growth and color.
- **8.** Refrain from fertilizing the lawn in the hot summer months. This reduces the chance of burning the lawn and saves money by using less fertilizer. Fertilizing less frequently and in moderation will save you money and help protect local aquatic ecosystems.
- **9.** Follow the lawn mower manufacturer's recommended maintenance schedule. This will help to cut down on air pollution.
- 10. Switch from a gasoline-powered to a battery-powered lawnmower, and say goodbye to gasoline, oil, and air pollution. You will also be doing your part to help thwart climate change.

The Palmer Township Police Department is pleased to announce the graduation of Captain Jeff Karp from the School of Police Staff and Command (SPSC) at Northwestern University.

Captain Karp along with 22 members of SPSC Class 534, successfully completed the 22 week Staff and Command program held from October 10th, 2022, through March 26, 2023.

The program, which was implemented by the Center for Public Safety in 1983, has graduated over 18,000 students both nationally and internationally.

He was enrolled in SPSC class #534 which accommodated a total of twenty-three students for a 22-week period.

The School of Police Staff and Command provides upper-level college instruction in a total of twenty-seven core blocks of instruction and additional optional blocks during each session. The major topics of study include: Leadership, Human Resources, Employee relations, Organizational behavior, Applied Statistics, Planning and Policy Development, Budgeting and Resource Allocation.



Each student is academically challenged through written examinations, projects, presentations and quizzes in addition to a staff study paper that are all parts of the curriculum. Upon completion, students may be awarded a total of six units of undergraduate credit from Northwestern University in Evanston Illinois.

The Center for Public safety was established at Northwestern University in 1936 with the specific goal of expanding university-based education and training for the Law Enforcement Community. Since its inception, the Center has broadened its original objective and now provides a variety of courses and programs in the area of Police training, Management Training, and Executive Development.

The Palmer Township Police Department anticipates a variety of benefits from Captain Karp's attendance at this program. Many of the program's graduates have gone on to achieve a variety of leadership positions within their respective agencies.

PENNSYLVANIA LAW ENFORCEMENT ACCREDITED AGENCY

The Palmer Township Police Department received our initial Accreditation on July 16, 2014, from the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission.

The Palmer Township Police Department was Awarded re-accreditation in 2017, again in 2020 and most recently this year, 2023.



PALMER WINS GRANTS FOR THE BUSHKILL GREENWAY AND 9/11 TRAIL

We are excited to announce Palmer Township was awarded grant funding to support new projects along the Bushkill Creek and the 9/11 Trail. In the Fall of 2022 and the winter of 2023 our Board of Supervisors asked the Planning, Parks & Recreation, Public Services and Public Works departments to identify projects most in need of grant funding. Topping the list were projects that could improve the quality of the Bushkill Creek, the use and enjoyment of its parks, and the condition of the Palmer Bikeway/Two Rivers Trail now host to the September 11th National Memorial Trail.

Bushkill Creek is one of our most important creeks because it has a state-wide designation of 'Cold Water Fishes' stream and if cared for properly can host native brook trout. Its watershed is one of the largest of 19 watersheds in Northampton and spans nearly 80 square miles of land and collects rainwater from six boroughs and eight townships. In Palmer, it runs along the eastern border of the township and at times is edged by thin wooded riparian buffers, parks, trails, homes, and some historic mills and factories, one of which is the birthplace of Crayola Crayon. Planning and improvement of the Bushkill Creek corridor and the parks along the creek was identified as a top priority of the 2020 Parks, Recreation and Open Space Plan: Tomorrow's Palmer, Sustaining the Legacy.

Our first grant of \$75,000 comes from the Pennsylvania Local Share Account and will help fund the Mill Race Park and 9/11 Master Trail Plan. A volunteer committee, planners, and landscape architects will help residents reimagine the park use and make sure people of all abilities can access the park's amenities and especially the September 11th National Memorial Trail (9/11 Trail). We're proud to host an important segment of the 9/11 Trail and to honor those who perished in that terrible tragedy and who today use the trail from New City to Central Pennsylvania and Washington to pay tribute.

Our second grant of \$75,000 comes from the Northampton County Livable Landscapes Program and will help fund the Bushkill Creek Greenway, Park, and Trail Master Plan. Another volunteer committee will work with planners, landscape architects, and specialists to study the creek and the entire corridor of open space, natural areas, parks, and trails along the Bushkill Creek from Tatamy Borough down to the Binney & Smith historic birthplace of the Crayola Crayon. When it's complete, the plan will help prioritize improvements throughout the entire Bushkill Creek corridor.

SMOKE DETECTOR SAFETY MESSAGE

Smoke detectors are a key part of a home fire safety plan. When there is a fire, smoke spreads fast. Working smoke detectors give you early warning so you can get outside quickly. In a recent National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) report, risk of fatality in a home with working detectors is 55 percent lower than homes without working smoke detectors. Almost three out of five home fire deaths were caused by fires in properties with no smoke detectors or detectors that failed to operate. Some helpful tips:

- Smoke Detectors should be located on each level of the home and inside each bedroom. We recommend installing smoke detectors on the wall of ceiling above the bedroom door. We also recommend closing your door when you sleep as research proves closed doors slow the spread of fire and smoke.
- Detectors should be mounted on the ceiling or high on a wall. Keep smoke detector away from the Kitchen at least 10 feet from the stove to reduce false alarms.


- It is best to use hard-wired, interconnected smoke detectors with battery backup power. When one sounds, all detectors sound.
- Test the smoke detectors once a month. Press the test button to be sure the detector is working.
- Replace batteries in smoke detectors at least every six months. Rule of thumb is change batteries when you change the clock for daylight savings.
- Replace all smoke detectors when they are 10 years old. The manufacturer date is located on the back of all smoke detectors. If older than 10 years from the manufacture date, then replace.


